The Siena School Hosts 20th Annual Celebration

Siena honors clinical psychologist Dr. Anthony Henley, along with local key supporters

This year's 20th annual <u>Cypress Leadership Awardee</u> was DC-area clinical psychologist <u>Dr. Anthony Henley</u> for his instrumental work in psychoeducational assessment, consultation, and more for children with dyslexia, learning differences, and ADHD. Henley is a past president of the <u>D.C. Capital Branch of the International Dyslexia Association</u> and has served on the national board of the <u>International Dyslexia Association</u>.

Dr. Henley has supported The Siena School and its mission since it opened in 2006 and has long been a part of Siena's extended professional community. "One of the most important aspects of my career has been the dyslexia community," he noted in talking about his decades of consultancy and advocacy, reminding the audience to keep celebrating "the gifts that are often seen with our dyslexic students."

The <u>Northern Virginia campus</u> serves grades 3-12, and the newer <u>Silver Spring campus</u> serves 3-4.
