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The Siena School Hosts 18th Annual Celebration

Siena honors artist and dyslexia advocate Gil Gershoni along with local key supporters

Silver Spring, Maryland, and Oakton, Virginia, October 20, 2023 — The Siena School held its 18th annual Fall Celebration and Awards Evening on October 19, 2023, in person on both campuses.

Each year, the Siena community celebrates school achievements and recognizes important contributions to both Siena and the wider field of dyslexia education. This year for its 18th annual celebration, Siena honored <u>Gil Gershoni</u> for his creative and dedicated advocacy on behalf of the dyslexic community.

Gershoni is Founder and Creative Director of Gershoni Creative & Dyslexic Design Thinking. His <u>Dear Dyslexia</u> postcard project showcases the diversity of the dyslexic experience and has activated "a global community around the unique strengths and perspectives that dyslexia offers—what we call **hyper-abilities**." To highlight their hyper-abilities. Siena students have participated in Gershoni's project, joining many other schools nationally and internationally in trumpeting their strengths and creativity as dyslexics.

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To date, Gershoni has received almost 1,600 postcards from people around the world from ages 6 to 82. In accepting the award, Gershoni stressed the importance of being oneself and leaning toward one's strengths and creativity. Gershoni talked about his own dyslexia, evolution of the Dear Dyslexia project, and ongoing advocacy work. "Celebrate the gift of your dyslexia," he said in closing.

In addition, <u>Dr. Lorrie Ness</u> and Oakton community member Bill Poulos received Siena's Key Supporter awards. Silver Spring Head of School Katie Douglas thanked Dr. Ness for being a steadfast "partner in our shared work of expanding possibilities...through early identification, understanding the gifts of this profile, and connecting families with Siena so we can work together to benefit our students."

Northern Virginia Head of School Jennifer Betts thanked local resident Bill Poulos for his supporting efforts—both on behalf of Siena and the larger Oakton community. "We are so grateful to have our neighbors invest in our mission and our growth," Betts shared.
