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veryone learns in their own way. Some rely more heavily on visual images to absorb information; others need to hear verbal explanations; and then there are those who prefer physical exploration. Some students are analytic, while others are intuitive. Some like concrete examples; others are drawn to the abstract. While most are able to succeed in a traditional classroom setting, some benefit greatly from programs that use a multisensory approach. Several schools in Montgomery County cater to nontraditional thinkers, some—but certainly not all—of whom have learning disabilities or attention issues.

The Nora School (est. 1964)

"There is no typical kid here," said Dave Mullen, head of school at The Nora School in Silver Spring, "but what they all have in common is that they are bright and college-bound." With 60 enrolled in grades 9 through 12, Nora provides an enriched educational environment "for students with learning disabilities, those with special needs who don't need a high level of service, or kids from big public schools who were getting lost in the shuffle." The school's size precludes cliques or self-segregation, Mullen said.

Small class sizes of six to 10 students allow teachers to "get to know students as individuals—their strengths, weaknesses and passions,"

Mullen said. "Most importantly, kids here are known and have a voice."

At Nora, students are encouraged to step outside their comfort zones. At some point in their high school career, students play on a school athletic team. They also perform community service once a month. "Students get to know each other and their teachers in different ways when they're not in the classroom," said Mullen.

A five-minute walk from the Silver Spring Metro station, Nora sends students on field trips to historical and cultural sites such as the Corcoran Gallery of Art, Newseum and Arena Stage. Wednesday assemblies feature guest speakers or interesting activities that build on what students are learning.

The Siena School (est. 2006)

With 75 students in grades 4 through 12, The Siena School in Silver Spring incorporates multisensory learning into its curriculum. "Using all five senses makes things more vivid for a kid, more real," said Clay Kaufman, cohead of school. "For example, if we're studying the Vietnam War, we'll bring in guest speakers to talk about their experiences, watch a movie or video, create art, and take a field trip to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial to see the wall and talk to people. We wouldn't just read a speech in a book, we'd watch it."

In addition to monthly field trips, Siena—which caters to students with mild to moderate language-based learning differences, such as



dyslexia—employs simulations and role-playing. For example, students studying World War II might imagine themselves as advisers to President Truman and argue in favor of or against the dropping of the atomic bomb. "This is our approach all the time—every day in every single subject," Kaufman said.

Siena helps students understand their learning styles and gives them strategies to succeed. "Parents often come in with a list of accommodations and ask, 'What are you able to provide?" Kaufman said. "All of it. That's how we function. Our students need and deserve those accommodations. There's never a battle or process to go through."

Siena embraces any existing individualized education plan and immediately provides the necessary accommodations and then looks to see what else might be needed.

Understanding that students and parents are looking for a well-rounded school experience, Siena hosts a prom and has several sports teams. The school could more than double the size of its student body over the next several years, as it is in the process of purchasing a larger building.

The Diener School (est. 2007)

Featuring a "collaborative, integrated, therapeutic program," The Diener School in Potomac owes its success to experiential learning, said Lois McCabe, head of admissions. Diener serves students in kindergarten through grade 6 with "language-based learning disabilities or sensory-processing, attentional and executive-functioning problems or social-pragmatic language issues."

Many of Diener's programs take place outside the classroom. Bi-monthly field trips are integrated into thematic social and academic lessons. Students also learn through movement. Activities such as jumping or clapping may be used to help students remember certain concepts or principles, as rhythm and cadence promote fact retention.

Themes enhance the curriculum. "It's wonderful having an entire month to delve into a topic and made it rich," McCabe said. Younger students studying landmarks
