MYTH:
The best schools are
the big-name schools.

Fact: The best school is the school that fits your child's needs — developmentally, socially, academically and emotionally. For example, a big-name school might be a poor choice for a child who is brilliant but anxious.

"Any independent school can be wonderful for the certain students." Our independent schools wouldn't be in business if they weren't providing an excellent academic, co-curricular and social education," said Worch.
