



Student's Artwork Juried Into the Congressional Art Exhibit

SILVER SPRING, MARYLAND, **April 30, 2012**- Several students from The Siena School participated in the **2012 Congressional Art Competition**. Eleventh grader, Cameron Heller's piece was chosen to be on display at the exhibition. More than 260 students submitted artwork but only 95 pieces were juried into the exhibit. Cameron's artwork was inspired by stained glass pieces created by Frank Lloyd Wright. He carved his template out of rubber and used a block printing technique to transfer his design. Cameron attended an awards ceremony in Washington D.C. and received a Congressional Certificate of Participation personally from Congressman Van Hollen. He expressed his admiration for the artwork of his peers, "I was blown away by the other pieces in the exhibit. Some of them were very impressive." The Congressional Art Competition is a nationwide high school visual art contest sponsored by the Congressional Institute, to encourage artistic talent in the nation. Participants submitted their artwork to their representative's office, and panels of local artists in each district select the winning entries. Winners are recognized at an annual Awards Ceremony in Washington, DC. More than 650,000 high school students have participated since the competition began in 1982.
